Then next day, on Christmas Eve, we'd all go to the candlelight service at my home church; sing carols and light candles (I always liked lighting my candle). Then we returned home to cookies, milk and sometimes, opening a present or two. Then Christmas morning would arrive and...well I'm sure you can

Thinking about what God did by becoming human in the form of His Son and living with us, dying for us and rising to save us, changed my focus on what Christmas was all about.

It's not a date on the calendar. It's not a holiday season of shopping and gift giving. It's not families gathering. It's not singing carols or lighting candles. It's now more than that. It's celebrating the most incredible gift the world has ever seen – God becoming flesh and dwelling among us – God, flesh and blood, living, feeling and experiencing

life as we do – being helpless as a baby, dependent upon His earthly parents – God as a teenager – God as a son, a blue collar carpenter with callous, rough hands – who felt pain and weariness like we do – who reached out and touched the leper, healed the sick, fed the 5,000 and who chose to suffer the worse death imaginable at that time in history. God incarnate – one with us – lived and died for us. Through Jesus, we can see God more clearly. Through this baby in a manger, God chose to identify with us so that we could know that He cares and loves us.

Now Christmas is all those wonderful past experiences and joys, but it is more. It is time to

remember God's gift of love and hope. It is time to celebrate the miracle of the incarnation – God becoming human. It is time to respond back with love and devotion to our Savior. It's a time to be amazed and in awe of what God did and is doing for us.

May we all have a wonderful Christmas and be filled with the awe of God's love through His Son Jesus Christ.

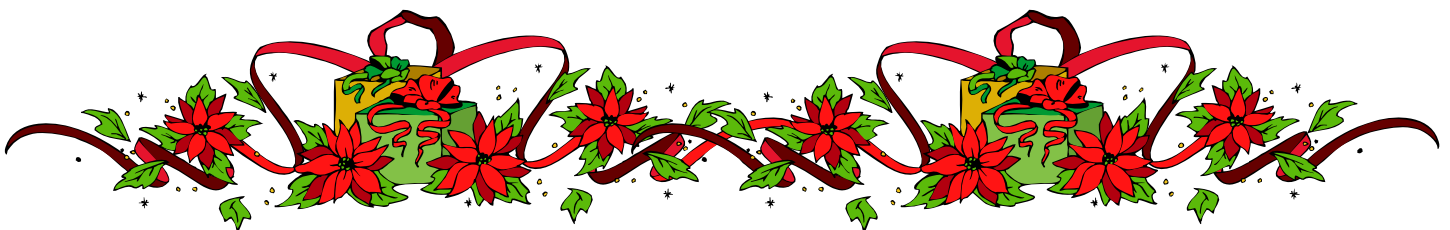


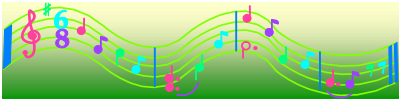
CHRISTMAS POTLUCK SUPPER

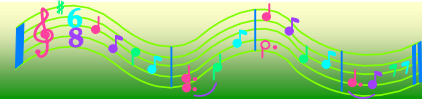
Ham, turkey, beverages, and dessert will be provided. Please bring a dish for the buffet table.

THE PARISH NURSE HEALTH CORNER

**“Whoever wants to be first must be the slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many.”

The Thanksgiving and Christmas Holidays are a peak time for faith, family and friends. It is also a time for more depression than usual. Folks up north get SAD (Seasonal Affective Disorder) while folks in Florida often miss their families. One sure cure for this sadness is to reach out and touch someone else. Our church has many sick, elderly and single people. Just sending a card with a note is a blessing to someone else. I have been privileged to be with elderly folks and watch the joy a card or letter brings. Often an older person doesn't get much mail, especially if relatives are paying their bills. To up the ante, you could make a telephone call or a visit or invite this person to a holiday meal. For ideas of who to call, feel free to contact the church or me. Consider praying for this person every day, as well. We can all be “Jesus with skin on.”

Are you taking vitamin D yet? There are oodles of literature stating vitamin D3 is helpful for hearts, blood pressure, bones, CANCER, and cold and flu prevention. At least 1000mg/day is recommended. Many doctors are checking vitamin D blood levels now. Last week my mailman told me he was low on vitamin D...go figure.

Don't forget to eat everything in moderation this holiday season. Gaining a few pounds is no way to start the New Year. Here are some hints:

- Every small piece of candy and/or cookies add up in calories.
- Don't become too hungry, eat frequent small meals.
- Eat protein about every three hours to increase satiety.
- Increase satiety with small amounts of healthy fats (nuts, seeds, avocados).
- Eliminate fried foods, trans fats and most animal fats.
- Increase your water intake.
- Alcohol has many calories and increases hunger.
- Last but not least, don't forget to exercise!

My father would have been 100 on December 14th. He died when I was six years old. My mother died in December of 1991. After her death, I realized that eyewitnesses were dying off. At my mother's funeral, I asked my uncle to tell me about my dad; instead he focused on himself. At a recent Lunch 'n Learn we had Dan Cormier from Story Keeper USA. Dan preserves family memories by digitally audio taping someone's life story. He has a professional way of doing this and he makes many copies. Mission Project

Your Mission Team is selling Butter Braid Coffee Cakes. This project is to raise money for any special mission needs, such as Christmas for Immokalee children, school supplies, etc. The coffee cakes are frozen dough that you thaw, let raise, and then bake. They are of excellent quality and the cost is \$12 each, of which \$5 goes to the mission fund. Call the church office to order.

Make Your Preparations 'Advent'-urous

Advent — the first season of the liturgical year — includes the four Sundays and weeks prior to December 25. Advent dates from the fourth century, when it lasted 40 days and included fasting and solemnity, much like Lent.

Advent is from *Adventus*, Latin for "coming," referring to Jesus' birth in Bethlehem and also his second coming. The traditional colors of Advent are purple for penitence or blue for hope.

Observing Advent is a meaningful, adventurous way to prepare for Christmas. Buy or make an Advent wreath and use candles of your choice: four blue, four purple, or three blue or purple and one pink. If you have a fifth spot, add one white Christ candle. During meals or devotions, light only one candle the first week. Add another for each new week (the pink candle traditionally marks the third week), concluding with the white candle (if you have one) on Christmas. The increasing light reminds us we're getting closer to celebrating Christ's light coming into the world.



While They Were Sleeping

It was an evening like any other. Ordinary men were doing an ordinary job. Shepherds were "keeping watch over their flock by night" (Luke 2:8). Was it chilly? Were they tired? When angels appeared with news of a Savior, had the shepherds been talking about their troubles or sharing a good joke?

How quickly, how mysteriously, how unexpectedly an ordinary night became the turning point of human history. How remarkable that God chose to set His great rescue plan in motion when only a young couple was paying attention and only a few shepherds were awake.

God's work is sometimes so secret we may wonder if He's there or if He cares. The Christmas story tells us that God works out breathtaking plans for our lives in the dark, often while we're sleeping or going about our ordinary routines.

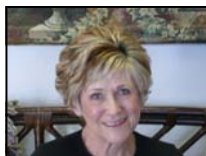
